

Draft 14 June of 10 Action Steps Checklist to stop a CSE supporting School Board

1. Get the name and view the curriculum

Contact teacher via email to request access. If necessary, contact School Superintendent via email. Request password to view curriculum and if denied, file a Freedom of Information request (see example). Request their help to make any changes needed.

Contact School Board members and meet with them individually to educate them about objectionable material and request their assistance. Ask them to view “The War on Children” video just prior to meeting.

2. Launch an educational campaign

Form a nonpartisan group to organize and plan your attack. Create a social media presence on Facebook and Twitter. Give out contact info on School Board members. Establish a community watch page with moderators. Set up meeting with the community (coffee shops, churches, politicians, local fairs) to educate them about objectionable material. Create online petitions to present to the School Board. Distribute Flyers. Speak at School Board and County Commissioners meetings. Meet with friendly local politicians.

3. Replace uncooperative School Board members

Start a Political Action Committee (PAC) and fundraise. Recruit people who will protect the children to be School Board candidates.

4. Send SB candidates questionnaire and document their receipt. (see examples of questions and questionnaire)
5. Ask each Candidate to meet for an interview to evaluate your group's campaign support. Have a 3 people from your group do interview (see example questions)
6. Group reviews Survey and Interview results and decides which Candidates to support in the Primary/General election.
6. Use the Survey answers to make a nonpartisan Voters guide (see example)
7. Find opportunities to Speak about why this election is important and who and why you are endorsing those candidates. (emphasize the positive about your candidates rather than criticizing the others)
8. Pass out your NONPARTISAN Voter guides to Churches to show members the Candidate's answers to the Survey question (Note-this can be done legally in Churches since you are not endorsing specific candidates. You are just providing them some of the Survey answers that all candidates gave to the questions)
9. Use Voter guide to make newspaper ads that endorse the candidates you choose. (see example) Note-your nonpartisan group can endorse a mixture of Democrat/Independent/Republican candidates.
10. Polls (primary and general) must be manned by group members (A few group members can handle the early

voting sites but need to recruit church/civic groups for election day to cover each site for the entire time they are open for voting if possible. Each voter needs to be approached and handed a Voter guide. Don't say negative things about candidates. Say something like "We are a nonpartisan group trying to protect our children from graphic sex education and believe these candidates will best do that". Poll workers need to be educated how important making personal contact with each voter is because many of the voters come undecided/uneducated about School Board issues and candidates.
